Peter Handke's play "Offending the Audience" (1966) challenges the notion that theatre is a space of pretense and representation and goes on to break down its mechanisms. His is an anti-narrative reading seeking to empty the theatre of its typical pathos and create something new in the vacuum created. The play deprives the viewers of the suspension of disbelief they expect. Time within the hall and outside is the very same. The dancers are nothing but the bodies they are, and the audience is an active participant in the moment.

The spoken, sung, written, and danced texts spread across the stage and coalesce in an amalgam of beauty and pain. The audience becomes a body aware of its physicality, of its being an active viewer, of its wretchedness, singularity, observational flexibility, and ability to undermine world orders. And when the rhetoric of "you" and "we" collapses, a flood of endless insults is hurled at the audience. Welcome, you pretentious lowlifes, motherland's sycophants. You will be moving soon. Get ready.

Nostalgia: A Lecture by Dr. Yael Doron

Why do we insist on longing for the past? Why do we mentally and sentimentally cling to bygone days? Was it easier and more comfortable back then? Or do we miss our old selves, childhood, and youth? Do we perhaps long to "rewrite" past failures? In the days between Passover and our national Memorial Days, we'll discuss memories, regrets, commemoration, and what we may want to accomplish further this year or in the future. We'll look back to improve going forward and connect longing with hope.

Dr. Yael Doron, a rehabilitation psychologist and group analyst, directs the Ramat Gan "Couples Institute," specializing in individual, couple, and group therapy. She is also a teaching staff member at the Tel Aviv-Yafo Academic College, Peres Academic College, and the Israeli Institute for Group Analysis. She lectures on psychology and relationships at conferences and workshops in Israel and abroad and facilitates workshops on personal and professional relationships in organizations and companies. Dr. Doron is an expert advisor on the TV program "Wedding at First Sight."

Since the outbreak of the war, Yael has met with evacuees from the Gaza Envelope, reserve units, private volunteers, and media personnel; she has been lecturing to organizations and companies, as well as to groups of people on the front and second lines, is being frequently interviewed on public media, and talks to people about their anxieties, reentering "the routine." and resilience and hope.
